I am now making The Windows for Mother Cabrini in El Paso. As most of us know from personal experience, it is not unusual for the gestation of a major church project to take years. This is how this project has been unfolding:

I first heard about plans for a new place of worship at St. Frances Xavier Cabrini Catholic Church in 2004 at the Form/Reform liturgical conference in Hollywood. That's where I first met Fr. Frank and several other parishioners from Mother Cabrini. Each January thereafter, I always looked forward to the Southwest Liturgical Conference and the latest updates from parishioners and Fr. Frank. Some years our exchange didn't amount to much more than a "Hi Jeff! Not yet." Well "yet" is nigh and I now will be happily up to my ears building the Windows for Mother Cabrini for the near future.

I also met Dennis Hyndman of Hyndman & Hyndman Architecture (Encinitas, CA) at that same conference in '04. Since then, I've always hoped to have a chance to work with his firm on one of their thoughtful, sublime church projects in California. It never occurred to me that many years later St. Frances Cabrini would provide just such an opportunity right here in Texas.



The Master Plan for the Windows for Mother Cabrini was approved last January. As an artist, it is always exciting to survive an intense creative episode and I am exceptionally excited about what we were able to accomplish. Maybe it was the dynamic architecture and its relationship with the windows, worship space and the path of the sun. Maybe it was because the Master Plan approach to the stained glass allowed us to consider the stained glass as a symphonic whole and not just individual windows. Probably it was both plus everyone's prayers, faith and perseverance over the years. With the design phase complete, it is exciting to now be fully immersed in the fabrication of the Windows for Mother Cabrini. Phase 1 Stained Glass should be finished by early next year. Stay tuned . . .
